



This piece incorporates those finds into a commentary on our relationship with plastics.





LUCY RIDGES





SANGEETA BHAGAWATI




IN UNFAMILIAR WATER

For the last four years, Bhagawati's printmaking practice has focused on channeling her cultural roots of India into her prints. She mostly works with linocut and Japanese paper chine-colle, but often takes on projects that include working on an offset press to create large scale monoprints.

The print "In Unfamiliar Water" is a monoprint printed using an offset press and it is inspired by the Indian folktales on ocean, where the fluidity of transition between human and fish forms offer a significant perspective on the interactions between human world and nature. The title of the print is also a reflection on the migratory route offered by oceans and water bodies to both humans and aquatic animals, which is often ingrained in the stories from her home country.

Physically printing the waves from oceans around the world with light sensitive cyanotype materials, Edwards' work aims to individualise the ocean and to give it a much needed voice. By taking a wave's crash from the sea shore and onto the gallery wall, her primary aim is to show viewers the oceans abstract beauty to urge them to want to care for.

Physically printing the oceans waves makes visible the moment when the ocean first makes contact with the land. Every wave is individual down to the the salt level of the ocean. The speed at which each wave makes contact and is printed echoes the urgency for change. By bringing forth the oceans fragile beauty, Millie hope to communicate a powerful human response.

Growing up in the modern world has inspired her use of vibrant colours, along with current social issues frequently being addressed through her paintings- for example, her painting 'Lost Identity' (addressing body dysmorphic disorder) which was exhibited at the MAMI Convention in New Orleans. 


DOWN THE ETERNAL STREAM Mixed media 58.5 x 47cm £440



Based in the UK, his work concerns many social, cultural and environmental issues in the contemporary world, exploring the glitches in the 'establishment'. Using digital glitch techniques and photo montage, he explores the 'glitches' in society and, with the digitally reinvented photomontage technique, uses collaging as its traditional function to provide the viewer with a critical representation of the world.

His work begins with a bleak and disruptive first impression, his works depicting war, riots, environmental issues and global political themes. Through photomontages, he addresses these contemporary issues by digitally shattering images from these events to point at what is broken in the system. This further operates as an illustration of the social issues and the hypocrisy of global governments that are not being discussed by the mainstream media. He takes the inspiration further with the choice of the Situationist inspired titles, creating a very direct relationship between the work and the viewer, and so a cause for reflection on the issues presented.
